Interview with the chairperson of Board of the Managment by Mara Prah

Our readers will like to know a bit more about you. Could you briefly tell us where you have come from, your family, your educational formation and working experiences over the years?

I come from South Derry and have been living in Citywest for about 16 years. My wife, Karen, is from this area and we met at University in Derry. More specifically, Karen was the person that I sat beside on the first morning at University! We became great friends and it was not until after college that we got together as a couple.

We have 2 boys - Eunan and Ethan. Eunan will be going into first class this September and Ethan will be starting Junior Infants. I guess, like many families, we find it incredible and fascinating watching them grow and develop.

In terms of education, I guess it would be fair to say that I took the somewhat scenic route to education. I left school at 16 with 2 O'Levels (junior cert level) at G and G in Maths and English Language. I then went to the local technical college and repeated some of the examinations that I had failed. I managed another 1 or 2 G rade G's.

Whilst I had enjoyed primary school, my transfer to the "big school" wasn't a happy experience. I didn't like it at all. I was very unsettled and just couldn't get myself applied to the work.

Through my teenage years I had a very keen interest in the society that we lived in and watched all of the current affairs programmes on TV and read the analyses in the newspapers. It was an interesting time to grow up in Northern Ireland. Between the "troubles", the politics, the hunger strikes, the Falklands war, the UK miners' strike, etc. there was a lot for a young person to think about. Not unlike the children in our school, there were lots of issues related to identity, religion, diversity, acceptance, and trying to figure out how to live in a society wildly different from that experienced by our parents.

My parents were, and still are, my heroes. How they were able to steer us through the complexities of life in Northern Ireland is something that was simply monumental. They gave me the character, personality, and skills to be still alive and "educated" about the basics of humanity.

When I was about 20 years old, I went to an open evening for the Open University. Surrounded by people of all ages and abilities, I felt that I could at least try a bit of "distance education". The OU are a fantastic university and I ended up tutoring for them on different courses - including many enjoyable Summer Schools.

I went to the University of Ulster as a mature student - aged 26 - to study psychology. I stayed there to complete my PhD and moved to Dublin after finishing.

At the moment, I am employed as a Professor of Educational Psychology at Trinity College Dublin. I get to work with many students who are teachers, principals, policy makers, etc. I convene the Inclusion in Education and Society Research Grouping and work intensely with my colleagues to make the Trinity Centre for People With Intellectual Disabilities an (inter)national centre of knowledge and excellence.

Being an academic means that life is never dull or boring. No two days are ever the same. No two students are ever the same. I have research

students who keep me busy - one who is in her 70's!

I am a Board Member of 22q11 Ireland and a Board Member of the European 22q Alliance Group - the national and European support groups for individuals and their families.

With our research in TCD, we are widening the approach and knowledge that we have regarding special educational needs to include all children and young people - those with disabilities, intellectual disabilities, complex needs, and rare diseases.

22q is an example of what we call "the most common rare disease that you've never heard about". Whilst some rare diseases are indeed rare, collectively they are very common and we need to ensure that our education system and society are fully inclusive of all of these children and young people.

I'm still learning. All of us are still growing and learning. One thing that I know for sure is that education is a wonderful thing - and that it is never too late to start a new course or plan for a new career. If you've been thinking of doing a new course or changing direction in your life - go for it. If you don't, you'll just spend all of your time thinking of excuses not tol

What were the circumstances that encouraged you to take up the role as the chairperson of the Board of Management of Citywest & Saggart Community National School?

This was a very easy decision in so many ways. I had many conversations with Seamus (school principal) and Orla (acting principal) about the school and the CNS model. I've also been very fortunate through my work at TCD to have been involved in many aspects of national and international educational policy and practice initiatives.

Being from the local community and having young children, I felt that if I could be of any use to our community, then it was something that I'd be happy to do. Everything that gets me up in the morning to the work that I do in TCD is evident in our school. Having a role on the school Board is just as much a privilege as aetting to do the work that I do.

Having grown up in Northern Ireland throughout "the Troubles", I have experienced first-hand the many aspects and interpretations of different religions, cultures, and traditions and their influence on people and communities. I was impressed by the ethos and contemporary thinking of the CNS model - that it is pointless trying to believe that religion doesn't exist across our many families - that it is much better to be accepting of each other and to learn from our children as we build the community.

We live in a beautiful country, a land steeped in a rich history of education and literature. Ireland has changed so much in recent years and our school community is a great representation of this new society - it makes me so excited to see this new Ireland in our community.

As the old saying goes, "What's rare is beautiful". Who would have thought a few years ago that this type of school would exist in Ireland? It is a beautiful development. We should cherish this - we wanted it. We can

build our aspirations for our children and the society they will develop for us. This is our chance to do something that our own parents didn't have a chance to do. Our children need us to do this right for them.

What is the role of the Board of Management concerning our school? How can the parents access information on what the Board plans? Does the school need the Board?

Hearing. Listening. Supporting. I think these are the words that come to mind as we support all of those in the school who care for our children. I think that we are very fortunate to be a new school in a growing community. We aren't hampered by any history and can plan for the school community that each and every one of us desires for our children and families

This is what the Board can do - be a conduit by which we can all have a voice in the education and development of our children. I have no intentions of leaving the area. I'd like to grow old here - feeling safe and happy in my community, perhaps with our children being the next generation to make Citywest and Saggart even better. The Board are there for everyone in the community. We want to do that. Help us to help you.

This year has been a busy one for the new Board, with lots of new and existing policies to review and ratify, new child protection measures, GDPR, and \dots the car park!

We will be working extra hard from September to ensure that everything we do is transparent and communicated as soon as practically possible with a renewed communication policy.

The Board is an important aspect of the school community. A school is a very complex thing - with lots more happening inside than most of us realise. I think that it is dreadfully unfair how teachers and the teaching profession are treated by the media and many in society. Ireland is really fortunate to have the calibre of teachers that we do. I really don't think that people fully realise just how special our teachers are. I can say that from work that I do in other education systems and countries.

We also have many super parents and guardians who give so freely of their time to help the school. One of the greatest developments in education of the last number of years is how there is a better link between the classroom and home. This really helps increase the value that families put on education.

Has the Board of Management got any plans when it comes to the question of the time plan for the new school campus?

We are frustrated by the delay - as everyone is. We are in a building that is not designed to be a school, with all of the attendant issues that brings.

The Board and the staff of the school have all been working relentlessly to resolve the issues that frustrate us about being stuck where we are
