### Interview with acting deputy principal Ms Amy Looney by Mara Prah



The school is an organization that learns from itself. The school principal needs to work with partners, participate in meetings, establish contacts, provide new opportunities for their teachers, and take effective economic and financial leadership. To realize this, one needs a strong, modern management team to delegate. The deputy is equally a vital cog in the mechanism as the principal. It was a pleasure interviewing **Ms Amy Looney** who is the current acting deputy principal.

## What inspired you to be a teacher?

I grew up as the eldest of my cousins on my mother's side, all of whom lived very closeby. My youngest cousin just recently turned four so you can imagine the range of ages! As a teenager, I loved spending time with children and spent a lot time babysitting my cousins and neighbours. I adore children's sense of curiosity and their excitement. I

have very fond memories of my time in primary school and enjoyed everything from maths to art to PE and Gaeilge. When considering my options in the Leaving Cert year, the variety of a primary school day appealed to me. You could be putting on a drama as Gaeilge in the morning, sculpting a vase between breaks and experimenting in science in the afternoon. I knew I would never get bored!

# Did you want this career as a child? What were your childhood dreams?

When I was in primary school, I definitely wanted to be a teacher! I looked up to my teachers and distinctly remember one, Mrs. Harrington, who I wanted to be like when I grew up. Thinking back now, I was definitely influenced by my Mom who is a secondary school teacher and my Dad who had a carpentry and construction business. I enjoyed looking at Dad's plans and imagining the buildings. I sometimes persuaded my Dad to let me go to work with him on a Saturday! I loved nothing more than climbing around building sites and up on the scaffolding while Dad wasn't looking (that was all before SafePass was introduced!).

# Have you ever thought about a different career? If so what?

Yes, by the time I got to secondary school teaching was a little bit down my list of career choices. I thought I would like to work with maths or science, maybe with some sort of artistic element as these

were the subjects I enjoyed most. Architecture majorly appealed to me (possible influence by growing up with Dad's plans around the house) and still does. I went to an all-girls secondary school which didn't facilitate practical subjects or tech graph. I think I would have loved these and had I done them, it might have been enough to push me to pursue architecture or engineering. As the CAO deadline loomed however, I

knew I would definitely enjoy the variety of teaching, spending time with children and the work-life balance that it offered.

### Do you feel that you have had an impact on the students that you've taught?

I hope so! Teaching Junior Infants for my first two years

in Citywest & Saggart CNS was such an experience. I think, as Junior Infant teacher you are such an important person in a small child's life as they begin their educational journey. I hope I have provided them a safe, friendly and supportive environment to begin to build their education. It was lovely to teach some of those children again this year, now in 2nd Class to see how they've grown and matured. Even in 2nd Class I still get pictures drawn and cards made for me which is so lovely and I guess means I must be doing something right in their eyes.

### What do you hope to achieve by being a teacher? Are you happy so far with what you have achieved as being a teacher?

What I love about a primary school in particular is the community it creates. I come from a small but very strong community in mid-Cork where everybody knows each other's name and looks out for each other. As the saying goes, it takes a village to raise a child. I love that a school can create that beautiful community closeness where it otherwise may not happen. I am delighted to be a part of the lovely community that I can see building here in Citywest, which is a collective achievement of all of us staff, parents, children and other community members.

Tell us about the three people who have most influenced your own educa-

### tion and educational career.

I couldn't pick three people, so I've given you three groups:

(1) My mother, as a teacher herself, and my father have had a huge influence on my education. They provided me with every possible educational opportunity as I grew up. As well as the opportunities, they also provided guidance. I wasn't always the most dedicated student and often found much better ways to spend my time than doing my homework or studying! I am grateful now that Mom and Dad knew better and made sure I did it anyway.

(2) I am very lucky to have grown up with a very close extended family. They were always there to offer encouragement and congratulations as I progressed through my education. More than once, I knocked on an aunt or uncle's door with my laptop and books looking for a quiet space to work.

(3) I have been extremely fortunate in my educational career so far. We work very hard developing our school each year but being part of such a young staff has provided me with lots of opportunities to take responsibility for and introduce new different initiatives and innovations. The support and trust of Séamus should you use Mr Conboy or is first names grand? and Orla has allowed me to progress my educational career in a way that I had never imagined.

### Tell us about a golden teaching moment?

Realising at Christmas time in Junior Infants that the children were now beginning to read and write sentences, something that they couldn't do in September was magical! I don't think much can beat teaching a child to read and write.

# What is the best and the worst part about your job?

Best - great people, children and friends on staff. Worst - paperwork!! I'd love to just teach all day!

# Teaching can be a stressful job. What do you do outside of school to relax?

I try to keep active as much as I can in the evenings and at the weekends. This could take the form of cycling, swimming, hill walking, tag rugby, going to the gym, basically anything that gets me moving. I usually need a goal to motivate myself to be consistent though so at the moment I'm training for a half-marathon and then I've an aquathlon coming up in the summer (I wanted to brush up on my swimming before going on holidays!). I also enjoy cooking and baking, trying out new recipes both healthy and deliciously unhealthy.


